





























The VCAL students are also selling Rainbow badges at the Butchers, Bakery & Royal Café to raise funds for their projects.

And so to 2021...

Our students here are continually having to think about their pathways through school and beyond and we do our best to help them navigate through their options and decisions. 2020 presented new and interesting challenges in many ways. There was an absence of Work Experience opportunities usually afforded Year 10 and 11 students, University and TAFE Open Days were virtual and there were restrictions on students' access to campuses across the state.

This year looks more promising with Work Experience opportunities and hopefully we can get through the year without too many "interruptions". Below is some information about our Pathways offerings and the things students and families should be aware of as students work towards pathways beyond Year 12.

WORK EXPERIENCE

Students in Year 10 are expected to undertake work experience during the year. Year 10s should do this during their holidays as well as the week we set aside at the end of Term 3. Year 11s can undertake work experience during their holidays and Year 12s are encouraged to undertake work experience as well to help them make decisions about what they might like to do beyond Year 12. Mrs Petschel and I are Work Experience co-ordinators and can help students with this part of their education.

OPEN DAYS

Tertiary Institutes around Australia usually hold Open Days and On-Campus Experiences for students at various times during the year. I will keep you updated as to whether this will be moving to online and virtual platforms this year. I will distribute a calendar with dates for Victorian and South Australian Tertiary Institutes to the students or they can be found listed at Openday.com.au They are well worth checking out for any Year 10, 11 and 12 students to help them, and parents, make decisions for this part of their lives. You can attend virtual webinars, information sessions, virtual campus tours and even check out accommodation, albeit online. Please consider this, plan ahead and make the most of the opportunities. They can be invaluable experiences and assist immensely with the decisions which must be made.

VTAC (The Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre)

The Year 12s who are considering going on to further study next year will need to apply through VTAC or SATAC (for SA unis). This process opens in July and remains open until September. It also opens again once students have their results in December. Along with this, students and their families need to think about moving away, accommodation etc beyond Year 12. I plan to hold an information session to help you through this process in early Term 3 (fingers-crossed) and I will send home a separate letter with details of this session. It is really important that all students and parents attend.

VCE/VCAL SUBJECT SELECTION

Year 10 and 11 students undertake this process during Term 3. With this in mind, I will hold an information session in early Term 3 which will outline the requirements and considerations for these choices. This will be followed by a one-on-one meeting with students, parents and me at which we will discuss, and hopefully plan, your child's pathway through this part of their schooling. I will send home a separate letter with details of this session closer to the time. Bear in mind that students can be thinking about and planning as soon as they like...ask around about subjects they might be interested in, talk to teachers, ask other students and build an awareness of what each subject is all about to make informed choices.

ANYTHING ELSE...

I am more than happy to help any students and/or families with pathways through school and beyond. It can be an exciting, but equally confusing time for all concerned. Please don't hesitate to contact me at the College if I can help in any way.

Great Victorian Bike Ride from Tessa Leach

Hello everyone.

As a start to getting prepared for the Great Victorian Bike Ride each week I will be putting in a cool bike activity to not only get your skills on a bike up but to get ready and involved in the GVBR this year! They will have tips on how to make the activity easier and more difficult to help you out. I also recommend that you collect these sheets for some variation on what you can do as the weeks progress.

The first activity this week is a drink bottle pick up.

What you will need:

2-3 water bottles

A bike (of course)

A driveway or a quiet street for the activity

Chairs or boxes (to make the activity easier)

What you will do:

Set up the water bottles a couple of meters apart on the driveway/road.

If you need to place them on boxes or chairs to make it easier.

What you will do is ride your bike and practice leaning to the side to pick up the water bottle off the ground or the chair/box.

Then you will attempt to place it back down and try not to let it topple over.

Do this multiple times, alternating hands each time you do it.

If the activity is too difficult:

Place the bottles on chairs/boxes

Place them further apart

If it is too easy:

Place them closer together

Increase the number of bottles

Try to do it faster

NAPLAN Online information for parents and carers

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests

Federal, state and territory education ministers agreed that all schools will gradually transition from the current paper-based NAPLAN to NAPLAN Online in order to provide a better and more precise assessment that is more engaging for students.

State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online. The current plan is for all schools to transition to NAPLAN Online by 2022.

One of the main benefits of NAPI AN Online is tailored (or adaptive) testing, in which the test presents questions of higher or lower complexity depending on a student's performance.

Tailored (or adaptive) testing is designed to assess a wider range of student abilities and to measure student achievement more precisely. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions more challenging than usual; they may be taking a more complex test pathway. A student's overall NAPLAN score is based on the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly,

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life.

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

Students are assessed on the same literacy and numeracy curriculum content, regardless of whether they complete the tests online or on paper. Results for both formats can be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale.

What can I do to support my child?

On its own, NAPLAN is not a test that can be studied for and students are not expected to do so.

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply do their best.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

Ensuring students are familiar with using devices, typing on them and navigating through programs is a part of student learning and a requirement of the Australian Curriculum from the first year at school.

NAPLAN Online is not a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. Year 3 students will complete the writing test on paper.

Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN assessment. Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. You should discuss the use of any adjustments for your child with your child's teacher.

A student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

NAPLAN Online timetable

The assessment window for NAPLAN Online is nine days instead of the three days provided for the paper test. This is to give schools flexibility in scheduling and accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN Online assessment window starts on Tuesday 11 May and finishes on Friday 21 May 2021.

The online test scheduling requirements are detailed in the table below.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year sevel.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be issued by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should centact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN test results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to better identify students who would benefit from greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas to improve in teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
