#### **ROYAL FAR WEST VISIT**

Next week we are lucky enough to have a second visit from the RFW team. Here is an extract from their flyer that went out to all junior families this week:



Royal Far West clinicians will be returning to visit our school this semester to provide a range of allied health services for students, and to plan and/or deliver associated professional development activities for our teachers and support staff.

This second visit will provide an opportunity for clinicians to deliver some face-to-face services to support the wellbeing of the students and school community, such as in-class activities, school staff support workshops and parent/carer learning opportunities. They may also provide individual occupational therapy, speech pathology and psychology, for some of our students. If you have specific concerns regarding your child's speech and language, fine or gross motor skills, or behaviour, ask school staff about the referral process or speak with a clinician during the visit.





# AGRICULTURAL ELECTIVE

Last Thursday the Ag elective students and VCE Ag class ventured down to Horsham in the two school buses to join up with the Kaniva Ag kids to spend the day at Emmetts John Deere dealership in Horsham. Tony Welch (Auto) and Amber Peters led the students through their safety induction and evacuation procedures and introduced them to what the day was going to look like.

The students were all issued with the Emmetts caps and split up into two groups to tour through the various area of the dealership. They learnt about sales, parts technicians, the online- shop, deliveries, mechanical repairs, machinery delivery and assembly, workshop areas and parts inventory. They also had plenty of opportunities to talk to all the staff that went out of their way to explain how they had individually arrived at their career destination.

The students were all treated to a great BBQ cooked by the staff and also got to talk to them about the technology involved in automation, driverless tractors, green on green spraying, remote detection and diagnostics, career options, the Techstar program training apprentices and what to expect when signing up to Emmetts John Deere Facility (in either South Australia or Victoria). The students were able to recognise the "Keeping farmers farming since 1957" slogan that embodied the ethos of the company.

This was another great chance for students to start to explore career opportunities in the Ag sector and to help solidify the thinking associated with pathways they may choose. It is up to them now to build on the relationships, check out regulations and options with Mrs Leach (careers teacher) and really start directing their efforts into securing places that are open to them.

A massive thankyou to Krissy and Nico who were in the "big kid's bus", Mr Rob and Mrs Fulton who had the "big bus but with the junior kids". And to all the guys and girls at Emmetts especially Tony Welch and Amber Peters who really went out of their way to make the day informative, enjoyable and realistic. This was all part of the Secondary Schools Agricultural Fund. Sheryl Lowe from the Wimmera Mail Times was also in attendance and spoke to many of our students during the day. She was super impressed with their level of involvement, manners and well thought out answers to the questions she asked.
