

School Wide Positive Behaviour Student Voice, Agency and Leadership



MAJOR AND MINOR BEHAVIOURS



ACTION FLOWCHART

Prompt

Verbal or non-verbal cues, given to remind students of the expected behaviours



Re-direct

Identify inappropriate behaviour and redirect to the expected behaviour



Re-teach

State and demonstrate the matrix behaviour. Have student demonstrate then provide immediate feedback

Examples:

- · Inappropriate language
- Incorrect uniform
- Lying
- Cheating
- Disrespect
- · Physical contact
- Disruption
- Teasing
- · Late to class
- Property misuse
- Technology misuse



Choice

A statement of two alternatives - the desired behaviour or a less preferred choice (logical consequence)



Conference

Use restorative conference script, apply consequence

Examples:

- Repetition of Minor
- Aggressive language
- Stealing / Plagiarism
- Physical aggressionProperty damage
- Bullying
- · Skipping class / school
- Dangerous behaviour
- Inappropriate touching

Major and Minor Behaviours

This flowchart shows how we approach challenging behaviours at school.

Our minor behaviours are addressed on the spot, with the staff member working from the top - a non-verbal or quick prompt to try and get a student back on track - to re-teaching the appropriate behaviour if necessary.

These events are recorded in a chronicle, which helps us to see if any patterns are forming and address problems before they become major. Parents will only be contacted about minor behaviours if they are ongoing, or if they escalate into major behaviours.

Major behaviours will always be followed up by a co-ordinator, consequences applied and phone calls made to parents where necessary. They will also be recorded in a chronicle entry, and restorative steps will be taken.

SPORTS EDUCATION IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM








